


ACORN'S BABY MASTER

As most members must be aware by now, Acorn's new baby has at last been born, and christened the Master Compact. The following press release was published on Ceefax:

"A New Master BBC Microcomputer

"On Monday 1st September, BBC & Acorn launched a new BBC micro in the Master range - the "Master Compact". This is an addition to the existing "Master" range of microcomputers. It is based on the Master 128, but is at a much lower price.

"This new micro uses the Master 128 technology. It is supplied as a complete ready-to-use package including disc drive, monitor, computer, and 'Welcome' software. It can use any existing Master 128 software supplied on 3.5 inch disc format. This range already includes several hundred titles from leading software houses. Extensive 'welcome' software is supplied - 430K of programs in total!

"Three packages are available:

- * Compact Colour including computer, 3.5" disc drive, and colour monitor.
Price: £687.35 inc. VAT

There are full details of the new machine, including photographs, memory maps, etc, in articles in the October issues of A & B Computing, The Micro User and Acorn User.

ACORN IN THE BLACK (ALMOST)

Acorn had an operating profit of £298,000 for the six months up to 30 June. This was turned into a pre-tax loss of £140,000 by the time interest charges were taken into account, but this is still a great improvement over the previous six months' loss of £2,900,000. Acorn say that sales of the Master series have exceeded their expectations, and the chairman, Alex Umboldi, is expecting even higher revenues in the next six months.

CHRISTMAS CARD COMPETITION

I know you don't want to think about it yet, but Christmas isn't all that far away. What we want from you is a design for an Abug Christmas card for members to send to their friend(s). It should be printable on a quarter of an A4 sheet, so that the paper can be folded to form the card.
